Dear Friends,

On Saturday 24th November the PCC are inviting everyone who worships at St Cuthbert's to meet together. We recognise that our church is going through a transition at present as we seek to continue to ensure inspirational worship for current church members but also discover fresh ways on encouraging others to also worship and discover God with us.

I remember once being given the illustration of a convoy as a model for a church. At first it seemed an odd example, because, so often we think of a convoy as a fleet of ships being protected and moving together, so in effect going at the pace of the slowest, even though this must increase the risk and vulnerability of them all. However, it was then pointed out that this is not the case. In a convoy the fleet is protected, but the slowest ship is not allowed to delay the others, but is individually escorted to allow the main fleet to move faster and be at less risk.

As a model for church it suggests that we need to need to move forward, but not at the expense of those who prefer the current ways, or even liturgy from further back. So for example we ensure that BCP Communion is still available and properly provided, or that the mid week communion is appropriate to those who attend, but then allow fresh styles of worship to grow too. Of course this extends beyond worship to other activities and church rhythms as well.

So the meeting will be an opportunity to recognise what St Cuthbert's means to so many, but also a chance to have conversations about the things we would like to see our church doing in the future, both current and new. For example if our children's work is important to us (and the re launched Sunday School has a lovely feel about it), how can we as a church better support work with children, teenagers and indeed young families, whilst not forgetting those more mature in years or who a single.

This is often refered to now a days as a 'mixed economy church', where different acts of worship and different types of activities are encouraged under the umbrella of the one church. Together with a further image of 'Lake and River', where one successful thing overflows as a stream or river to create a

new pond or lake. One service or activity grows and then begins to feed a further congregation or event.

As I have said frequently since I came here, and indeed talked about it at the interview, I have a vision for St Cuthbert's to be an inviting church. Where members of the congregation are willing and comfortable to invite friends; but also a place that when people do come for the first time they find it an inviting place, just as a good meal is so inviting.

So please do come along on the 24th Novemeber for 12:30pm in church, to ensure we finish at 3pm before it goes dark. This is a chance to help the PCC shape the future of St Cuthbert's. Please also pray for the meeting that we may hear God speaking to us , because after all it is His church and we are the stewards of it.

Emergency services' efforts to provide comfort for youngsters involved in distressing situations have been further boosted by a second group of Fylde knitters.

Members of the community craft group at St Cuthbert's Church in Lytham have supplied a batch of tiny knitted teddy figures modelled on firefighters to the crew at the town's fire station.

They were inspired by the Express's report a couple of months ago of the Bonney Fabrics knitting group in St Annes providing similar figures to Fylde traffic police.

The St Annes knitters had

been prompted to create the cuddly 'bobby buddles' after reading in the national press of how they had proved so effective in providing comfort in Dorset that the police force there had placed a knitting pattern on its website and invited members of the public to contribute.

Thelma Band, of the St Cuthbert's group, said: "We saw the story about the Bonney Fabrics group and my great grand-daughter Alisha-Jo said: "What about the firfighters?"

"So the group set about styling a batch of firefighters' friends.

"We really enjoyed making them and were delighted to present them to the crew at Lytham."

Thelma was joined by fellow group member Lana Ross at the handover to Lytham crew manager Stuart Healey and firefighter Paul Farman.

Paul said: "Thanks so much to the ladies.

"We think the knitted figures are a great idea for when we find youngsters instressful situations after fires and also for our fire safety initiatives."

At the presentation by Bonney Fabrics in July, PC Dawn Conolly-Perch, accepting the bobby buddies' on behalf of Fylde Police, said: "The time and effort put into making each bear is a fabulous example of how the local community can embrace an idea."

Remembrance Weekend

We have been talking about our planned activities for Remembrance Weekend for a few weeks now and the date is nearly upon us. So here is a brief reminder of what we have planned.

Our Tommies are now displayed around the church and at certain times of the day look stunning as the light reflects on them from our stained glass windows. During the week leading up to Armistice Day they will be going out and about in the cafes, restaurants and pubs of Lytham helping the town recognize the courage of those who have fought for our freedom, especially in this year which marks the Centenary of the end of the 1st World War.

We are also taking them into the local schools and will be leading assemblies on the Remembrance theme.

On Saturday 10th we will Open Church for the day and invite friends old and new to view the Tommies and Poppy Display and sit quietly or enjoy some light refreshments. In the afternoon there is a service, including time at our War Memorial outside the church hall. At 3:30pm the film Journey's End will be show in church (you may wish to bring a cushion) and this will be followed by a vigil (a time of silence to reflect personally and share your thoughts with God).

On Remembrance Sunday, as in recent years, we will have the one morning service at 9am before processing down Church Road to join others at the Cenotaph in the Market Square for the Civic Act of Remembrance. We will be taking the Tommies from church with us and children from Lytham C of E School and our Uniformed Groups will be assisting us. We are also lending some of our Tommies to the other Churches in Lytham for the Sunday and they to will bring them along to the Market Square.


